Robert returned to S&T in November 2003, and worked as a senior editor until January 2007. During that period, he wrote, edited, and commissioned science articles for the magazine and website, and produced the magazine's popular News Note Section. He also wrote several articles about amateurs who are contributing to scientific research. Besides his S&T experience, Bob worked as a researcher/reporter at Discover magazine from 1992 to 1995, and as an associate then senior editor at Astronomy magazine from 1995 to 2000. He served as editor in chief of Mercury magazine from 2000 to 2003.
